LETTER FROM THE FOUNDER

Dear Friends

With all the challenges our nation faced in 2021, one constant has been your love for, and care of, the children of Armenia, a dedication that is helping us rebuild lives and provide previously unimagined opportunities. COAF's unique formula for nation-building has produced remarkable success locally, and we are now taking our programs to the national level, starting with some of the country's most compromised regions, including Syunik and Artsakh.

Our work is grounded in the deep belief that national revival is achieved through individual advancement. Here are some examples of COAF success stories and how these high-achieving young people are blazing a ground-breaking trail for their communities:

Manushak Avagyan, raised in the rural community of Lernagog, is a beacon for COAF students interested in pursuing science. A graduate of the American University of Armenia, and former resident at the Yeolyan Hematology Center, she is currently studying in France as a research clinician, specializing in pediatric oncology. Manushak was encouraged to explore a career in health by COAF teachers and doctors, who recognized her potential. Her training began as a Medical Volunteer for COAF in 2014, and she has spent the past eight years deepening her knowledge and sharing her passion with the next generation of Armenians.

Anahit Vardanyan, a student with dreams of connection beyond her rural community, began her journey toward a Master's degree from Boston College by attending a range of COAF's English programs. Determined to expand her worldview and challenge her intellect, Anahit applied herself unstintingly, drawing on the resources and expertise of COAF's teachers and programs. As a teenager, Anahit won a place on the prestigious US FLEX Program, and recently became the recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship. Anahit credits COAF with expanding her academic horizons and laying the groundwork for her incredible trajectory.

Anush Sargsyan, Debet's dynamic mayor, represents a definitive step forward for rural Armenia. Elected due to her revolutionary, impact-driven development agenda, Anush has worked tirelessly to bring innovation and prosperity to the community. Her female-focused initiatives and hiring practices mirror our own, and this is not surprising, as Anush is COAF-trained. Open-minded and generous, Anush embodies COAF's ideal global citizen, and is the perfect candidate to lead the first SMART Village municipality into a transparent, democratic future.

Tatevik Aghababyan, a German-Armenian businesswoman, moved to the SMART village of Debet in 2019, where she is breaking new ground for entrepreneurs. Tatevik's first contribution to Debet was the founding of a shared living and co-working venture: Debed.life. This year, with help from partners such as COAF, Tatevik is opening a restaurant and bakery, bringing international culture and cuisine to the Lori region. By expanding the mindsets and palates of rural Armenians, Tatevik is helping forge connections between Debet and the outside world.

These are just a few of our ongoing success stories. COAF has an established track record of advancing the needs of beneficiary communities and taking decisive action to promote rural quality of life. We are proud to be ensuring long-term impact by instilling our values in the students and professionals who work and learn with us, teaching them to respect human dignity, uplift their communities, and thrive in uncertain, often adverse, circumstances.

COAF has always responded to the needs of rural Armenia with courage, critical thinking, and foresight. This year, as

we expanded our focus and initiatives to encompass the entire nation, our history of achieving community-focused progress has been acknowledged by an unprecedented number of partnerships with leading NGOs and essential branches of government. These include:

■Working closely with the Ministry of Health to create a model for a primary healthcare center in Dsegh, designed to serve 16 villages in Lori. The regional center's innovative approach to healthcare will provide a blueprint for Ministry replication across Armenia.

Peceiving a 3-year grant from the US Embassy to fund our work with the Ministry of Education, providing support for Armenia's nation-wide formal education system's English program, to ensure a generation's proficiency in the language of progress.

- Selection by the Ministry of High-Tech Industry to aid the digital transformation of rural agriculture, to help meet the urgent challenges of climate change and global scarcity.
- An invitation to participate on the Committee for Philanthropic and Development Initiatives in Artsakh, under the leadership of the State Minister (Armenia's PM).
- A commission from the World Bank to undertake a survey of rural demand for digital services, the potential of broadband access combined with skills training, and the missed opportunities caused by underutilization; COAF's input is now shaping public policy.
- New, strategic partnerships with the European Union Delegation to Armenia, the European Investment Bank, and the Embassies of Japan, Estonia, Lithuania, and France; no other organization in Armenia has garnered support from so many foreign partners.

In addition to these collaborative programs, COAF achieved lasting impact in rural communities by spearheading initiatives focused on broadening connectivity and advancing opportunities. We

IN HONOR OF OUR FIRST SMART CITIZEN

Three years after opening its first SMART Center, and a year after COVID-19 dealt one of the most challenging years in history, COAF graduated its first SMART Citizen.

COAF bestows the SMART Citizen title to students who successfully complete four educational programs at the SMART Center. The promise of Citizenship inspires rural children to dedicate themselves to learning, a commitment COAF fosters long after graduation, helping Citizens impact their communities and change the world.

Rudik Gharibyan, born and raised in Alaverdi, in Lori, was nineteen when he became COAF's first SMART Citizen on February 13, 2021. His two-year journey at the SMART Center allowed him to explore after-school programs ranging from Finance and AgriTech to Marketing, Musical Instruments, and Performing Arts. Rudik's path at the SMART Center nurtured the joy he found in art, bringing him a step closer to pursuing his interest in entrepreneurship and one day opening his own hotel.

Rudik understood the importance of the SMART Center, and the immense potential represented by uniting the children of Lori into an educated, innovative community. Rudik's inquisitive nature, creative spirit, and kindness touched the lives of all those around him. He was always looking for ways to meaningfully engage with the SMART community, exchanging ideas and sharing knowledge for the benefit of not only himself, but his fellow students and the future of the Armenian nation.

On February 14, 2021, one day after becoming a SMART Citizen, Rudik enlisted. Open to all kinds of learning, Rudik viewed his military training as an opportunity for growth.

Rudik outperformed the army's expectations and was awarded vacation time in September 2021, which he used to visit the SMART Center, calling it his "second home." During his visit, former teachers asked whether the location of his regimen, and their country, was safe. Responsible and considerate toward the feelings of others, Rudik responded, "As long as I'm there, you have nothing to worry about."



Sadly, on January 11, 2022, Junior Sergeant Rudik Gharibyan fell as a result of Azerbaijani aggression. He was posthumously awarded the Combat Service Medal.

Patriotic and passionate, Rudik's devotion lives on. For him, the SMART Center was more than a place for developing new skills: it was a second home and a lifetime of opportunity. His life, vision, and sacrifice will live on in the hearts of the COAF community, gathering those who knew him, and those who know of him, every July 16, to honor his birthday and the values he believed in and laid down his life for.

JOURNEY TOWARD SUCCESS

Lily Ghulyan from Odzun village was one of the first students to attend COAF's SMART Center in Armenia's northern Lori region. Guided by lively curiosity, a constant quest for knowledge, and a "nothing to lose" mindset,



the 16-year-old exemplifies a 21st-century citizen with multifaceted interests. So far, Lily has dabbled with a colorful mix of non-formal educational programs offered at the learning hub, ranging from Performing Arts, Dance, Programming, and Digital Drawing to Marketing and Management. "Rather than focusing my attention on one subject, I prefer to try different things and become skilled in multiple fields," says Lily, who will attend COAF's Finance program this academic year before deciding on the next steps in her educational journey.

Lily started her first professional experience at the SMART Center, interning during COAF's annual Summer Programs. This early exposure to work-life confirmed what she already knew: the key to professional success is self-education. From an early age, Lily cultivated the habit of using the World Wide Web as a self-paced learning environment, allowing her to become versed in various fields, from marketing and sound design to podcast broadcasting and meditation. "I can't imagine there will be a time in my life when I will stop educating myself," states Lily, emphasizing that "if we want to build a stronger nation, everybody has to work for it: individuals, communities, and government officials." Armed with this conviction, Lily vows that every step she takes is a step toward developing her community, Odzun.

Growing up in a village environment caused Lily to develop a sense of shame and doubt about her abilities. Visiting the SMART Center allowed Lily to join a community of rural youth from various corners of the Lori region and discover the great value of hailing from a village. With time, what may have been once embarrassment gradually turned into a source of pride. Her unconditional love for Odzun, which she calls "the heart of Lori," inspired her to create a community center and mobilize her peers (who do not attend the SMART Center yet "harbor great potential") to implement community projects aimed at increasing awareness and knowledge of Odzun and improving the quality of life for fellow residents.

For students who want to follow her example, Lily suggests working hard, dreaming big, and never giving up.



LEADING HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

On November 9, 2020, a ceasefire agreement was signed, ending the 44-day Artsakh war. Watching the conflict unfold and witnessing the fragility of human life, Armenians worldwide realized how necessary our vigilance and humanitarian work are.


For Armenia to survive, we must ensure its future by working together to provide world-class education, jobs, infrastructure, and opportunities to its citizens, so they can transform the county into a vibrant nation, where all of its children grow up in peace and prosperity.



HOUSING 13 FAMILIES

Thanks to the generous contributions of our worldwide community of supporters, COAF's 2020 annual fundraiser, "Moving Mountains," allowed us to address the influx of refugees from Artsakh by providing 13 displaced families (41 adults and 59 children) with newly-refurbished and fully equipped homes in the COAF-supported villages of Debet and Dsegh. In addition, the construction of new houses and the renovation of existing ones created temporary employment for 45 rural residents, and COAF continues to source local labor and skills whenever possible, furthering our mission of self-sustaining innovation.







ACCESS TO EMPLOYMENT

Another consequence of the war was the sudden increase in veterans struggling to reintegrate into civilian life. COAF, UNDP Armenia's ImpactAim Venture Accelerator, and FAST Foundation combined their expertise and founded the Revive Veteran Support Program. In the scope of this initiative, COAF led the Revive Capacity Building Program, offering veterans from the 2016 and 2020 wars vocational training and access to higher education, alongside ongoing mental health support and rehabilitation services for veterans and their families in our beneficiary villages.

HEALTH


COAF is working to modernize health services in rural areas of Armenia, creating and supporting programs that promote the wellbeing of entire communities. Through high-quality intervention and treatment, alongside accessible, comprehensive health education, we aim to provide generations of Armenians with the resources they need to take control of and demonstrably improve their physical well-being.

COAF's Health programs focus on disease prevention, patient advocacy, and modeling healthy behavior starting in primary school. We conduct hands- on training for local health providers, improve the physical conditions of rural health facilities, and implement dental and health screening services for at-risk residents.

CHILD & FAMILY SERVICES



COAF's Child & Family Services follow a holistic approach to child and family issues, offering multidisciplinary care by educators, social workers, psychologists, and speech therapists, who provide individualized and group, services and therapies to children and their families. By involving parents at every step, COAF is working to increase understanding around developmental disorders, decrease social stigma around mental health, and deliver quality early learning experiences to help close the opportunity gap, to ensure stable support systems for children across Armenia.

A child's brain develops faster from birth to 5 years of age than any ather time of life. COAF's early childhood education programs quality early learning experiences to help close the opportunity gap. In addition, COAF is unique in providing multidisciplinary care, including psychological support, speech therapy and social work services to children and families. COAF's Child & Family Services provide the foundation for children's emotional wellbeing and learning throughout life.

COAF's psychologists and social workers are instrumental in supporting the most vulnerable members of rural communities, reducing inequalities, and bringing direct assistance to people in communities.

Based on COAF's findings in close collaboration with local government and community residents, business and infrastructure projects are designed, developed, and implemented, each uniquely and specifically suited to the needs of the individual community.



Therefore, our SMART Campus system is a critical component of COAF's development method. This approach is designed to combine our non-formal education hub, the SMART Center, with a supportive network of social enterprises. By running its social ventures, not only does COAF create quality, high- paying jobs for rural citizens, but also generates revenue to invest directly into the development of youth and rural communities in a manner that promotes self-sustainability.




COAF SMART EDUCATION

COAF's SMART Citizenship Curriculum is mode ed on the innovative 3 Hs theory of learning (Head Heart, Hand), engaging the cognitive, social, and physical skills of youth aged 6-18 and allowing them to grow into healthy, socially adept, and academically accomplished adults. Creating accessible programs is a hallmark of our work, ensuring that all children, regardless of age, income or background, have the opportunity programming to learn, grow and thrive.

To complete the SMART Citizenship Curriculum and become a SMART Citizen, each student embarks on a personalized journey through at least 4 of the 18 programs, covering all three H's. Academic offerings include:



The educational path of COAF students is complemented by the SMART Citizen App, offering students online access to a vast array of educational resources and boosting their engagement by incorporating games, achievement goals, and personalized feedback into the learning experience.



Achievements

- 2,215+ rural children and youth from 27 communities received critical access to multifaceted after- school programs, designed to promote academic, emotional, and practical skills.
- COAF celebrated the inaugural cohort of 19 graduates from a two-year, intensive SMART Citizenship learning journey.
- 300+ students participated in COAF's Summer Programs, implementing 35

QUALITY EARLY LEARNING

The SMART Center's Child Development Corner affords children ages 3-6 critical access to high- quality early childhood education, preparing them for the transition from preschool to primary school. Additionally, our teachers and social workers closely collaborate to ensure that the social, mental, and physical development needs of all children are met.

Achievements

- 135 beneficiaries from 10 communities
- 65 program graduates who successfully transitioned to primary school
- 100% of children were engaged in arts, music, and physical education
- 100% of displaced children from Artsakh (whose families have settled in Lori through COAF's housing program) were integrated into COAF's educational programs and received need-based psychological and social support





ADULT EDUCATION

The SMART Center also offers educational opportunities for adults to study English and receive vocational training in fields such as agriculture and computer programming. In addition, COAF invites parents of Seed Track children to participate in education to enhance parenting behaviors and practices, such as promoting positive discipline techniques as well as play and interaction between parents and children.

Achievements

- 24 women from Armenia and Artsakh received training in nail and hair care as well as business management at the COAF SMART Center.
- 135 parents participated in parenting seminars, training, and art workshops, teaching them how to create games and toys for their children.
- All local government staff participated in English language classes throughout the year.

The COAF SMART Campus also features sustainable enterprises, designed to bring local and international business travelers and MICE ventures (Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, Exhibitions) to Lori's countryside.



CONCEPT HOTEL BY COAF

The Concept Hotel's modern design, numerous amenities, and location at the foot of Lori's majestic mountains makes it a popular destination for both business and leisure travelers.

As a sustainable social enterprise, the Concept Hotel contributes to local economic development, creating jobs in the hospitality and tourism sector. All revenue is reinvested in COAF's programs.

VISITOR CENTER BY COAF

A further effort to enhance tourism in the Lori region is COAF's Visitor Center, which serves as a gateway for travelers to Lori, offering friendly and comprehensive travel information and allowing tourists to tap into the region's heritage, flora and fauna, and culinary offerings. Additionally, locals and guests benefit from practical services such as an ATM, bike rentals, etc.

COAF is expanding its Visitor Center to contribute further to develop and market Lori as a tourist destination. The new space will include a café, a souvenir and travel shop, and trained, knowledgeable staff.

MY FOREST ARMENIA NURSERY



My Forest Armenia and COAF partnered in 2019 and established a 1.5 ha forest nursery on our SMART Campus in Debet. This initiative allowed us to offer employment to local workers.

Together, we aim to sustainably increase forest coverage, reduce carbon in the atmosphere, and foster biodiversity in Armenia.

SMART DEMO PARK

In collaboration with the UNDP in Armenia, COAF launched the "Sustainable Income Through Effective Household Management initiative, targeting the sustainable development of the entire value chain for raspberries and engaging 81 rural families in berry cultivation.

Additionally, the raspberry field serves as an agro-demo site, where SMART program attendees receive training on modern-day agricultural practices.


Debet village is home of the SMART Campus. The community's central location in the Lori region and its medium-size population and varied demographic makes the village a perfect candidate for advancement. Critically, Debet is likely to face depopulation by 2040, if circumstances for residents do not change.

Achievements

- Large-scale renovation of the Debet Municipality and the paving of the road and parking lot surrounding the building in order to create an efficient work environment, ensure accessibility of local government, and optimize decisionmaking
- Opening of a modern, multifunctional community library, equipped with the necessary resources to host social gatherings and events to initiate community engagement
- Establishment of high-speed and reliable fiber optic internet to enable uninterrupted connectivity and facilitate communication
- Installation of with 50 energy-saving streetlights to illuminate the streets of Debet and increase road safety, Building a new bus stop shelter equipped with real-time travel information
- Roof repair and insulation to maximize energy efficiency and safe living conditions for 6 family households
- Construction of a community playground where children can engage in physical activities with fun and joy as well as learn to play and interact with each other

COAF is actively working to turn the tide. By initiating a series of self-sustaining, interconnected measures to increase business, infrastructure, and social development, COAF is investing in the bright future of Debet.

Civic engagement is at the core of a vibrant democracy and begins at the local level. COAF is working with Debet's municipal authorities to involve residents in decision-making processes, ensuring each citizen a voice in community-level improvements while building trust between citizens and their local government.







